

#### WHAT CHANGED, AND WHY?

What is a Section 106 Programmatic Agreement (PA)??

 A way for FHWA to legally delegate authority and provide an expedited process for actions that have limited potential to adversely affect historic properties

What is the advantage of using a PA?

- FHWA delegates consultation to a single agency (MDOT SHA) that administers federal-aid funds
  - Replaces current standard of local jurisdictions separately consulting with MHT
- Provides an expedited review process for qualifying projects
- Standardizes the process and brings Section 106 reviews to MDOT SHA alongside NEPA reviews







Following the PA is <u>required</u> for local public agency (LPA) transportation projects receiving federal-aid funds that are facilitated by MDOT SHA

- Examples of funding programs include:
  - Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP), Safe Routes to Schools (SRTS), National Recreational Trails (NRT), Scenic Byways, Local Government Bridge Program, Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC)
- LPA projects receiving state funds from MDOT SHA will also follow the process outlined in the PA



- MDOT SHA can internally review projects meeting exemption criteria without further consultation with MHT or others
  - Majority of LPA projects will likely be exempt



### PA AMENDMENT STREAMLINES NEPA

Cultural resources review incorporated into NEPA the same way it is now

- Difference: MDOT SHA will now coordinate on behalf of Local Government
- Local government will no longer need to send letters to MHT

MDOT SHA Environmental Managers (EMs) are now the point of contact between local government and MDOT SHA cultural resources personnel

- Local Government will still provide mapping, project description and plans (if available) to the EM
- MDOT SHA cultural resources personnel will work with MHT to complete coordination and may reach out to the Local Government for follow up items

- Providing project information early in the process is critical
  - ✓ Good location and project maps


✓ Plans (if available)

 Description of project and worst-case limits of disturbance (LOD)


- All projects that appear to fit exemption categories will be assessed by MDOT SHA cultural resources professionals
  - If it fits an exemption category (and the project doesn't change), cultural resources review is done!
  - MDOT SHA provides MHT with reports of exempt projects
    - Exemption documentation will be provided to the EM
    - The EM will provide exemption documentation to LPAs
  - MDOT SHA will facilitate further consultation with MHT and consulting parties

#### NON-EXEMPT PROJECTS



Most LPA projects will be exempt!

 Additional coordination required for projects that don't fit exemption categories

Non-exempt projects may need:

- MHT letter coordination without surveys
- Cultural resources survey and reporting
- A very small number will cause adverse effects and require agreement documents and more extensive coordination



### INADVERTENT DISCOVERIES

Inadvertent Discovery Plans (IDPs) will almost always be required

Ensure the on-site contractor has a copy

The IDP template lays out:

- Recognizing Cultural Resources
- On-site Responsibilities
- Local Agency Project Manager's Responsibilities
- MDOT SHA's Responsibilities
- Proceeding with Construction usually possible even while the find is being examined

#### LPA RESPONSIBILITIES FOR NON-EXEMPT PROJECTS

- Provide adequate project information to MDOT SHA through your EM
- Assist MDOT SHA by identifying potential consulting parties with a special relationship to the project we may not know about
  - (property owners, local residents, etc.)
- Conduct/procure any necessary cultural resources studies
   MDOT SHA will assist in defining scope and other guidance
- Work with their consultants following MDOT SHA's review to make any needed revisions prior to MHT submittal
- Work with MDOT SHA and MHT on any agreement documents to resolve adverse effects (if necessary)

#### FHWA RESPONSIBILITIES

- Delegate responsibility to MDOT SHA to establish undertaking and initiate Section 106 process in accordance with PA
- Ensure tribal nations are identified and consulted; consult directly with tribal nations upon request
- FHWA will participate in consultation if there is an adverse effect to historic properties

### MDOT SHA RESPONSIBILITIES

- Determine whether project fits exemption categories
- Define Area of Potential Effects (APE)
- Conduct all formal consultation with MHT
- Coordinate with tribal nations and consult with other identified Consulting Parties
- Review reports and other deliverables prior to MHT submittal
- Make effect determinations prior to MHT submittal
- Take lead on developing agreement documents if adverse effects are unavoidable

#### MHT RESPONSIBILITIES

MHT = MD SHPO / MD's State Historic Preservation Office Visit our website at <u>https://mht.maryland.gov/</u>

- Facilitate Maryland's compliance with Section 106
- Coordinate with MDOT SHA on projects requiring consultation
- Comment on reports, other deliverables, and effect determinations
- Work with MDOT SHA and other consulting parties to negotiate agreement documents to mitigate adverse effects

#### SECTION 106 AND TRANSPORTATION PROJECTS IN MARYLAND



MD 180 Retaining Wall

During the past 5 years, MHT reviewed 2,565 transportation projects with the following findings:

- Projects with No Effect/No Historic Properties = 1,518
- Projects with No Adverse Effect = 626
- Additional Information Requested = 402
- Projects with Adverse Effect = 19

Less than 1% of transportation projects resulted in adverse effects on historic properties

#### WELCOME LOCAL PROGRAMS!

- Maryland's PA for transportation projects has been in effect since 1993, with a proven track record for consultation efficiencies
- MHT welcomes the addition of local programs to the PA
- The new coordination process in the PA should benefit LPA projects by:
  - Using MDOT SHA expertise to handle consultation
     Streamlined review of exempt projects
  - ✓ Timely completion of transportation reviews
  - ✓ Achieve projects deadlines and schedules
